Pray for **HEAL Africa** in the Dem. Rep. of Congo

(HEAL Africa is an organisation located in the town of Goma, DRC, and is the home to several ministries including a hospital, mobile clinics, orphan care, rape victim support, safe motherhood and a ministry to pygmies. Since 2007, PAC has supported two chaplains at the hospital. Several of our members have been on short-term trips there. Here is their latest prayer letter since rebel groups took over the town last month.)

The situation in Goma remains relatively calm, but there is a lot of random violence from robbers and there have been a number of murders. The crimes are blamed on a variety of militia members, military personnel, civilians and the thousand prisoners who escaped when M23 rebels came into Goma. People are hoping that the talks in Kampala will yield some stable peace. Meanwhile, life in Goma continues. Relief is getting through to the camps. HEAL Africa is partnering with American Refugee Committee, Tearfund UK and PPSSP to provide help for the internally displaced. But gender-based violence has surged again, and women are coming to various <u>Wamama Simameni</u> safe houses for care and referrals. It is still a difficult time.

Thanks to all of you who have contributed in recent weeks, HEAL Africa's emergency response is making a difference today, and we are planning tomorrow's long-term recovery and community building efforts. We are praying for a stable peace agreement that will provide justice and peace so that people can go about their daily work and think about their futures. These are challenging issues that will need a variety of responses for a long time to come.

Yet we know that a peaceful future is possible. We have seen it in the-faces of women who confront the daily challenges of keeping themselves and their families safe and healthy. We have seen it in the-faces of leaders who work every day to turn the hopes of their communities into reality. We have seen it in the-faces of elders who bring wisdom and patience to our struggles

Please support the brave men and women of eastern Congo as they create the path to peace. No matter where we are, we can take this journey with them.
