

Thank God for the Resurrection of Jesus!

The Gospels tell of a tombstone rolled back and a shaft of light entering a place of death. It is a picture of the light of the world that entered a place of death to bring new life. It's as unexpected as it is life changing for each and every one of us.

Israel had long acknowledged that God isn't detached from His people. He didn't simply finish His creation work, wind it up like a toy and then leave it to its own devices. Their testimony was of a God who is active in history. A purposeful God, determined to move His creation from broken relationships to a renewed wholeness with God, with each other, and with the world. But, for Israel, resurrection was to come at the end of the age. Instead, here is Jesus, rising to new life "half way through the present age". This changes everything.

The past - with its pain, failure, broken relationships, shattered plans - presses into this moment. The new possibilities of wholeness, of hope and wellbeing erupt into it. Past and future is embraced in this present reality. Not what it was, not yet what it will be.

Every Easter Sunday, we proclaim what this ultimate foil to a broken world means: Christ is risen, He is risen indeed! The resurrection anticipates new possibilities, new hope and new life in those who believe. "This is the transformation that begets all other transformations. Death to life. Something only God can do."*

As the people of God, we are invited from death into life, from brokenness into wholeness. We are invited to participate in God's continuing mission and live a new resurrection life.
